

Secondary School health profile:	Stonehenge School

1) Population	The number of pupils who attended Stonehenge School in October 2012 was 664. This is lower than the Wiltshire average school size of 1022. There were 368 pupils in the year groups 7 to 9, 296 in years 10 and 11 and 0 in years 12 to 14.
2) Child poverty	In Amesbury community area 9.4% of children live in poverty. This is lower than the Wiltshire figure of 11.6%.
3) Eligibility for free school meals	In Stonehenge School, 9.5% of pupils are eligible for free school meals. This is not significantly higher than the Wiltshire figure of 6.4%.
4) English as an additional language	The percentage of pupils who do not speak English as their first language in Stonehenge School is 3.5%. This is similar to the Wiltshire figure of 3.4%. Within the Amesbury community area there are at least 4 different languages spoken by pupils whose first language is not English. In Wiltshire there are at least 35 different languages spoken by pupils with English as an additional language.
5) Special educational needs	There are 39.6% of pupils in Stonehenge School with special educational needs. This is significantly higher than the Wiltshire figure of 15.9%.
6) Risk of NEET Index score (RONI)	Stonehenge School mean RONI score of 13.19 is higher than the Wiltshire mean of 6.32. After ranking these scores, Stonehenge School came 24 out of 29 (1 indicates the most positive mean RONI score).
7) Service families	There are 169 children between year 9 and 11 from service families per 1000 pupils in Stonehenge School. This is significantly higher than the Wiltshire figure of 58 per 1000 children.
8) Youth offending	Stonehenge School has 48 youth offenders per 1000 pupils in the school years 9 to 11. This is significantly higher than the Wiltshire figure of 23 per 1000 pupils.
9) Mode of transport	In Stonehenge School 54% of the pupils walked to school and a further 4.2% cycled between 2009 and 2011. This is significantly higher than the Wiltshire percentage of students who walk to school; 42.1%. It is also significantly higher than the Wiltshire percentage of students who cycle to school; 2.8%.
10) Common assessment framework (CAF)	For the Amesbury community area between the ages 0 and 19 there were 14 CAFs open per 1000. This is similar to the Wiltshire figure of 11 per 1000.

Health and Wellbeing

11) Teenage conceptions	From 2009 to 2011 there have been 32 teenage conceptions per 1000 15-17 year olds in the Amesbury community area. This is not significantly higher than the Wiltshire figure of 27 per 1000.
12) Physical activity	At Stonehenge School it is estimated that 421 pupils (63.4%) participate in 3 hours of sports education each week.
13) Obese and Overweight Year 6 pupils	Approximately 31.9% of year 6 children in Amesbury community area are obese or overweight. This is not significantly higher than the Wiltshire figure of 30%.
14) Smoking prevalence	At Stonehenge School it is estimated that 33 pupils (5%) smoke.

Admissions to hospital

15) Alcohol admissions	There were 82 annual alcohol admissions to hospital per 100,000 under 18 year olds in Amesbury community area. This is not significantly higher than the Wiltshire figure of 66 per 100,000.
16) Drug admissions	There were 148 annual drug admissions to hospital per 100,000 under 18 year olds in Amesbury community area. This is similar to the Wiltshire figure of 161 per 100,000.
17) Accident & Emergency attendances (A&E)	In Amesbury community area there were 198 per 1000 A&E Attendances between the ages 10 to 18. This is significantly lower than the Wiltshire figure of 244 per 1000.
18) Accidents (non-intentional)	Annually, between the ages 10 to 17 there were 1279 accidents that led to a hospital admission per 100,000 in the Amesbury community area. This is significantly higher than the Wiltshire figure of 888 per 100,000.
19) Self-harm	Annually, between the ages 10 to 17 there were 338 hospital admissions for intentional self harm incidents per 100,000 in the Amesbury community area. This is not significantly higher than the Wiltshire figure of 276 per 100,000.
